#### Overview

The event will present recent research into the future impacts of climate change on humanitarian crises and discuss how we can respond to them. Specifically, it will present findings from <a href="INFORM Climate">INFORM Climate</a>
<a href="Change Index">Change Index</a>, which provides quantified estimates of the impacts of climate change on the future risk of humanitarian crises. The event will then examine how humanitarian donors and organisations can use this kind of data and information to support operational and policy responses to the humanitarian climate emergency.
